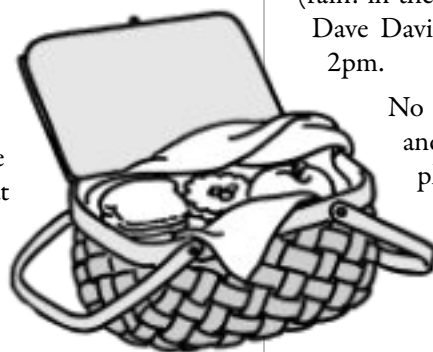
in Danby!

ITHACA HONORS ROBERT WESLEY

IN MAY, THE TOWN OF ITHACA planted a tree to honor F. Robert Wesley, one of Danby's talented residents. The tree was an appropriate monument, considering all of the botanical work Wesley has done for our region over many decades.



Wesley was the 2025 recipient of the Richard B Fischer Environmental Conservation Award. He was honored for more than fifty years of acute, dedicated, and detailed attention to the Unique Natural Areas of Ithaca's botanical environment. He has created many sharp-eyed inventories of natural life. He shares an

encyclopedic understanding of open spaces. He has been a crucial influence the advancement of land protection efforts: preserving native species and management of invasive pests.

We're fortunate to have such a resident in Danby. Robert has graciously led wildflower walks for the Danby's Community and Park formerly Community Council). During COVID, he led virtual walks on Zoom, sharing his amazing plant photography with the community. He knows where to find the rare plants in the wet lands around Jennings Pond and in parts of the state forest. He has illuminated our rich variety of native plants.

Robert travels across the region to document everything from stone walls, old barns, farm sites, and cemeteries...and the native and naturalized flowers that grow there. You can see some of these on his Facebook page. His photographs are beautiful, and are detailed documentation of the rare and wonderful beauty to be found right where we live.

SFLX HONORS BETSY KEOKOSKY

TO SPREAD THE WORD about its *Neighborhood Mini-Grants*, Sustainable Finger Lakes highlighted Danby resident Betsy Keokosky, who has been active in conservation and community resilience efforts. Imagining, and creating projects, both large and small, for community resilience is core to who Betsy Keokosky is.

Danby Land Bank

More than a decade ago, Betsy gathered various interested parties (landowners, hay farmers, and others) to create a *land bank*. The idea was to harvest biomass from otherwise fallow fields, and to use it for renewable energy production. It was an idea well ahead of its time. While various obstacles prevented full development of the plan, it served to make its participants even more aware of the value of useful open space.

Project Abundance

Many of us remember the COVID-19 pandemic: the isolation, the fear, the heightened longing for community. Like many, Keokosky and other members of the Ithaca Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) sought to nurture community connections amidst the chaos.

Together, they created *Project Abundance*, a community garden in Ithaca's Northside neighborhood. Keokosky recalls, "I thought of the word 'abundance' because it was such a different feeling from 'pandemic lockdown' and it was something to make people feel better."

The group was awarded funding for raised garden beds outside the Third Street Meeting House. Community members take home crops, herbs, and flowers from the raised beds. To Betsy's surprise, the garden has lasted almost five years. Now, she, "would love to have better signage and posted information on taking care of plants and the soil," and hopes to morph the project a teaching platform as well as a sharing platform.

To Betsy, Project Abundance remains relevant in today's political climate: with people are getting less money from SNAP being able to walk by a garden and pick something makes people smile. It's important to find things that make you smile.

Sustainable Finger Lakes

CHOOSING YOUR OFFICIALS

ON TUESDAY, JUNE 23, New York State voters will head to the polls to choose their party's nominees for public office. This year, there are both Democratic and Republican Primaries but, as often happens, no local races are contested.

New York State's Election Law creates what are called, "closed" primaries. Voters must be affiliated with the party running the primary in order to vote in that primary. Poll workers are sometimes forced to disappoint voters who arrive with the desire to vote for a specific candidate, only to find they aren't affiliated with that party. FWIW, the deadline to declare a party affiliation was February 14.

Statewide Primaries

The Democratic Primary will choose the candidate for NYS Comptroller who will appear on its line in November. There are three candidates: Tom DiNapoli (incumbent), Drew Warshaw, and Raj Goyle. Unlike most elected officials, the Comptroller's role is largely administrative rather than legislative or policy-making.

The Republican Primary will choose an opponent to run against Congressman Josh Riley (D, NY-19) from two candidates: Alexander Portelli and Peter Oberacker.

No Danby Candidates On Primary Ballot

Barring an unusual write-in campaign leading up to the November General Election, Danby's winners in the Supervisor, Highway, Superintendent, and Clerk races are already known: there are no other announced candidates, only incumbents.

Take Advantage Of Early Voting

Early, in-person voting runs for 9 days—Saturday June 13 thru Sunday June 21. There are two polling places, out at the airport and, downtown, in the old Assessment Department offices, upstairs from the Board of Elections on Buffalo Street.

What with all the fuss about how the November election might take place, voting early and in-person makes a lot of sense. The modern slogan might be: *Vote Early, Vote Once.*

Poll Workers Wanted

The Tompkins County Board of Elections is always looking for more Poll Workers. Every activity requires a team representing both major parties; because there are fewer Republicans in Tompkins County, REPs are needed!

Workers are paid. Even though the NYS voting rules are pretty much common sense, workers receive detailed training. 🐾 (tc)

NO COOKING, NO CLEANUP

IN SOME HOMES, dinnertime begins by spinning the culinary Wheel Of Fortune, whose wedges are labeled with dinner dishes instead of dollars. Spin the wheel to pick the daily menu.

Some households have very thin wedges and an extensive repertoire of choices; others have only a few, easily prepared favorites. All of them have a common downside: someone's got to cook, and someone's got to clean up.

It's a real treat to take a night off, and a bigger treat to go casual and still dine on tasty comfort food. The Ithaca area has many fine dining establishments...and almost as many comfort food joints.

You could go for burgers. *Wendy's* dining room is about as comfortable as a wooden board (which, you'll find, is exactly what the chairs are made of) but *Chili's* offers a much better burger (its 3-For includes salad, fries, and drink) along with comfy booths and table service for about the same price.



If you can eat dinner early, *Old Mexico* has a Lunchtime Fajita special that'll send you home satisfied. It also offers Taco Tuesday, where you can chicken (or beef) out to your heart's content.

If Asian Food is your weakness, try the lunch specials at *Spicy Asian*. Don't be put off by its name; few of the lunch items offer any heat.

Meat lovers, try *Texas Road House*. The Early Dine special (weekdays) menu includes meats ranging from red, thru pink and even less pink, to the white of chicken.

Looking for greenery and ready-to-heat?

Check out *Wegman's* and *Greenstar*. You can choose your portions by the pound; one price fits all. 🐾 (tc/psg)



WHY IS THE *DANBY NEWS* LIKE PUBLIC RADIO?

THE *DANBY NEWS* is the place to go in Danby. But, why is it like Public Radio? In a nutshell, neither one is beholden to partisan government interference.

① We primarily present items from community members and organizations. Like Public Radio, the DN provides information that supplements and, sometimes, clarifies official, sanitized verbiage in expensive, taxpayer-funded publications.

② By law, government publications *must* present the government in a positive light. To paraphrase Public Radio, “Our goal is not to please the government we cover, or to manufacture an appearance of balance. We aim to present the facts as we know them.”

③ The choice to defund both the DN and Public Radio was not budget-related. Sometimes, public officials feel threatened by distribution of a different perspective. Danby now budgets about twice as much for its house organ than it formerly paid for the DN. Danby’s powers have said, on the record, that they expected [and intended] their decision to defund would shut down the DN.

④ Both the DN and Public Radio depend on the your contributions to keep an independent voice alive.

TREASURE FOUND IN DANBY FOREST

WE SPOTTED AN INTRIGUING HEADLINE in the *Ithaca Voice*. It promised promised mystery, adventure, and the beauty of botany all at once: *He went out bushwhacking and discovered a new plant species.*

The adventurer was a Cornell PhD student, Justin Scholten, and one of his adventures was in the Danby State Forest. Scholten studies plant hybridization and often spends time taking plant pictures in local State Forests. Back in 2023, Scholten bushwhacked his way to something he’d never seen before.

All he expected to do was look and take pictures. But his practiced eye spotted something unexpected: a pink baneberry. Normally, the berries of this low-growing plant are red or white. At first, he thought he’d found a hybrid.

All parts of the baneberry plant are toxic, that’s why it’s called a baneberry. They may be beautiful but Don’t. Eat. Them.

Scholten’s excitement didn’t have an immediate reward. He spent the next few years researching where the pink baneberry is found and what its characteristics are. Guess what? *Actaea rhodostigma* can be found in the Danby State Forest. If you want to travel farther away, check out the Summer Hill State Forest, where Scholten first found the plant.

Genetic data confirmed that Scholten had not found a hybrid baneberry but an entirely new species; the first new species identified in the NY State in about ten years.

The story of this discovery is a reminder that there are still things we don’t know about nature. Even though we live in an area where the flora has been extensively studied, Scholten says, “There’s always new things to go find.”

What other natural treasures may be found in the protected undergrowth of the Danby State Forest? Maintaining the integrity of forest preserves is crucial, if we want to discover and protect such unusual finds.

Coincidentally, we’ve heard that NYS legislators are considering a bill to allow additional power transmission lines to be constructed within the Danby State Forest. Danby’s Town Board approved a resolution, to be sent to State officials, recommending against this privately-profitable but ultimately destructive idea.

Scholten emphasizes that even relatively low dose of the fruit would be enough to kill an adult human. For more interesting details about this adventure, read the full article in the *Ithaca Voice* archive. 🐾 (pg/tc)

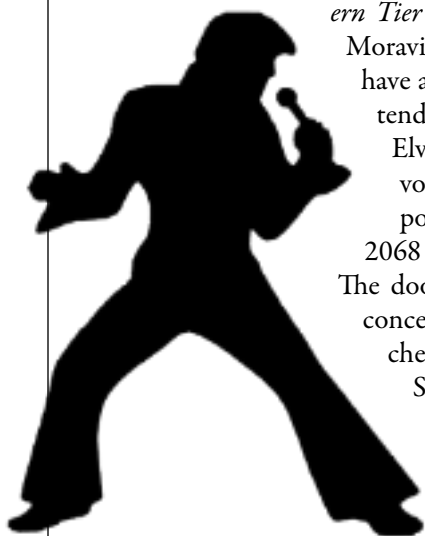
- Wagon Ride through the beautiful countryside, weather permitting
